ROOT STRENGTH: Interdependence

A few weeks ago I asked the group gathered for mid-week Bible Study to think of a sacred place. After a few moments of silence the group shared about the places they imagined. One member said that standing among redwood trees of the Pacific Northwest was her sacred place. The striking beauty and enormity of these majestic trees are awe-inspiring.

I have to be honest, aside from a few pictures in magazines, I have never seen redwood trees before. I do not know much about them. I know they are huge and tower above the others trees in the forest. I also know that redwood trees never grow alone. They always grow along side other redwood trees. The reason for this is because the root system of a single tree is incapable of keeping the tree upright. In fact, for their size, the roots do not grow very deep. As redwood trees grow beside each other, their roots grow out laterally, becoming entwined in a way that makes them strong for one other. Their interconnected roots give them the support they need to stand.

Like these mammoth trees, Christians are never intended to grow alone. They are called to be part of a fellowship – the church. In this fellowship, Christians are interdependent upon other Christians for health and growth. Wendy M. Wright states, "Our growth in Christ is a communal venture!"



This is a lovely thought, but the application is frightening. It requires a tremendous amount of mutual trust. My spiritual health and growth as a disciple of Christ is interdependent upon you, and vice-versa. When I became part of the fellowship of College Avenue Friends church I am trusting that you will help me remain strong in faith, and the way you do this is by remaining strong in your faith. Whatever spiritual cultivation you do has a positive affect on me. When I neglect my spiritual well being, that has an affect on you. In a profound way, because of Christ,

Christian lives are intertwined with each other. While the term interdependence is not found in the Bible, it is a biblical concept. 1 Corinthians 12, the Apostle Paul used the metaphor of the human body to illustrate this concept.

I am blessed to be part of the fellowship of College AvenueFriends Church. The root strength of our fellowship is our devotion to God and our interdependence to each other.

There is a need for Friends to pray for the continuing emergence and wholesome growth to maturity of these God called leaders. Their ministries will serve both the Society of Friends and peoples of the world in a magnificent array of ministry roles.

Missions

Jamaica is a land not far from lowa and yet its missions are quite different than our meetings. *Dwaine Williams* is the current manager of the Lyndale Girls Home and Swift-Purscell Boys Home. *Dwaine, Becky, and daughter Sarita* have served in Jamaica for 3 years. Becky and Sarita are involved in a remedial reading program with the students. Sarita, age 16, is also being home-schooled by her parents.

Being the manager of both schools has been an extra challenge. The Boys School had been without a superintendent for over a year. A large praise is the addition of Donald Stewart as the new Boys School Superintendent. He has been a youth pastor and his Christian family sets a good example for the boys. The Williams' ask for prayers for Don, as there is still much for him to learn.

There are currently 21 boys in the boys home and 29 girls in the Lyndale Girls Home. The children are at risk children since they have not had a good home life. There is usually no money or contact from their families, although encouraged. Students attend the Highgate Friends Church. Regular times for chapel are held in the homes. The youth program on Friday nights is led by Mandy Goode and Sarita. Dwaine leads a Bible Study on Wednesday nights.

The children live in dorms but attend public schools in the area. These classes are for boys and girls. Public school is free with the exception of books, uniforms, lunch money, special exams, transportation, and school supplies. Children's Services (referral agency where the home students come from) sends a stipend for each child. This does not cover all the costs, so additional funding is needed. Money is needed for the school fund, maintenance costs, sponsoring children, and special projects. (The Williams' request your prayers. A permanent replacement for them is needed by the end of this summer. Their term will be finished in August.)

The newest connection to Jamaica are former pastors from lowa, *Eugune and Frances Wolfley* who serve as pastors at Worthington Friends in Jamaica. They also do extensive evangelistic work, are currently helping to establish a recording procedure for Jamaica Yearly Meeting, discipling a couple who desire to be recorded, and are making provisions to host groups and work teams.

Missionaries LOVE to receive communications from you! Interest and questions about their work is also encouraging.






As of April 3, 2002, \$163,439 has been raised toward the \$250,000 challenge grant to Quakers

106 men came from across the United States; from Carolina to Iowa, to seek the will of the Holy Spirit for their lives. There in Plainfield, Indiana, at "ARISE AND SHINE", a twenty four hour, God honoring, Spirit led, speaker inspired, prayer filled gathering – the Lord showed His continuing desire to pour out his love and grace on a group of humble men, bowed before Him.

We arrived on Friday evening, Gary Septer and Mike Martin (Marshalltown), Neil Martin & Phil Gould, (Bangor), Bill Griggs (Clinton), and Tony Gray & Erwin Lopez (Oskaloosa). It was soon obvious that God had called together this group of men to live the Christ centered life that men of a century before knew well in the American Yearly Meeting of Friends.

"ARE YOU READY FOR CHANGE in your life?" was asked through God's spokesman, Randy Clendenin of North Carolina. As did Isaiah in the year King Uzziah died (Isaiah 6), so we as men before God, saw again the Lord lifted up. We had to say with Isaiah, "I am a man of unclean lips – Now bring the coals from the fire of your spirit and cleanse me that I may say too, 'Here am I, send me."

"ARE YOU WALKING BY FAITH?" was the challenge of the three hour Saturday morning meeting under the anointed preaching of Marc Jackson of Stavanger Friends in Iowa. All present searched their hearts to see if there were "strong holds" in their lives, the misuse of time not directed by the Lord, the addiction to things of this earth that clutter and confuse, corrupt and waste away the gift of life. A man from Chicago in the waiting time came forward to confess the strong holds of his life. With much prayer and tears with him, we saw and sensed God's deliverance of this man from the "strong holds" that prevented him from a close walk with Jesus Christ.

"ARE YOU WALKING IN THE POWER OF GOD?" This question was raised up well by Steve Pedigo whose life, itself, always presents this question for consideration. Twenty-five years of walking the Cabrini Green streets of Chicago and presenting Christ to everyone, was another challenge of a lifetime for every man to consider. Small groups of 10 to 12 met to get acquainted, share needs, joys, burdens and then pray for the Lord's touch on each need and situation expressed.

Concluding on a cold rainy day in Plainsfield, Indiana, David Phillips of Wabash, Indiana brought the final focus of the gathering with the question, "IS YOUR WALK GUIDED BY A MISSION, A PURPOSE AND A BALANCE" especially as you live with your family, your local Christian fellowship and among the people of your community? David's presence as a disciple and friend of Jesus Christ with the shared fellowship of God's gift of more than 500 disciples in Wabash County, gathered under his pastoral leadership, impacted our lives likewise.
