



#### **More Than Protesters**

One of D. Elton Trueblood's most quoted Scripture passages was I Peter 3:15b-16a, "Always be ready to make your defense to anyone who demands from you an accounting for the hope that is in you; yet do it with gentleness and reverence."

When someone hears that you are a "Friend," do you feel a need to try to explain to them what a "Friend" is. Are you ready to give them an account of your faith, hope, love and trust? Where should we begin, to explain who we are and what is important and distinctive about Friends?

Since many people don't know anything about Friends, we may ask, "You have heard of Quakers, haven't you? Then they may think, "Oh you are one of those peculiar people who lived a longtime ago, like the man on the Quaker Oats box. Other people are amazed that Quakers have been in existence for more than 350 years.

I am very proud to be a part of our 350 year heritage. The first thing I want people to understand about my faith as a Quaker is that we are members of the Church, the Body of Christ in the world today. We are not some vague fringe group that rejects and protests against the essential doctrines of the Church.

My concern, is what we understand and believe is the essence of being a Quaker or a Friend or a Christian. The terms are synonymous. We need to recognize all that we hold in common with all believers and followers of Christ Jesus, rather than our differences. Friends seek to embody Jesus' teaching and commands into our daily lives, as George Fox did. At a young age, George Fox took the Scriptures very seriously, he determined if the Bible says our Yea must be Yea, and our Nay, Nay, it means that we must always speak the truth. George Fox was perplexed when the actions of some men were inconsistent with the Christian faith they professed. At 19 years of age he went in search of a faith which would really show itself in the lives of those who professed it. After consulting various preachers and priests, for three years, he would write: "And when all my hopes in them and in all men were gone, so that I had nothing outwardly to help me, nor could I tell what to do; then, Oh then I heard a voice which said, 'There is one, even Christ Jesus, that can speak to thy condition;' and when I heard it my heart did leap for joy." This fresh realization of the saving power of Christ came to George Fox.

He and his followers did not set out to reform the Church, they

sought to revive primitive Christianity. But those in established churches were suspicious of the "Children of the Light," as they called themselves at first. While on his way too a meeting in Nottingham, George Fox felt inspired to go testify in a certain church. The minister was delivering a sermon in which he explained that "the sure word of prophesy was the Scriptures, by which the people must try all doctrines..." George Fox cried out, "Oh no, it is not the Scriptures!" He explained, the Holy Spirit which inspired the Scriptures, was the one sure guide to truth. He was taken away and shut up in prison.

Near the time George Fox was to be released, the Commonwealth needed soldiers to resist its enemies who were arming in support of Charles Stuart's claim to his father's throne. Fox was offered a captaincy in the army, in recognition of his leadership qualities. But he replied, that he "lived in the virtue of that life and power that took away the occasion of all wars."

I cannot think of a better way of defining who Friends are. Living in the virtue of that life and power, (of the Gospel) is not just the basis of our "peace testimony," it is the basis of Friends every day life. We seek to live continually in communion with God and our community. Our faith is received through Jesus' baptism of the Holy Spirit, which John foretold. We believe the Holy Spirit guides us to understand the Scriptures and reveals God's will and direction to each of us. We trust that God's will can be known and followed by individuals and communities. All Friends are called to follow the leading of the Holy Spirit, but each one of us must follow our own leading.

Friends understand, we are called to live faithfully, according to Jesus' teaching and example. We take his words, spoken to his disciples, literally: "You are my friends if you do what I command you...I have called you friends, because I have made known to you everything I have heard from my Father."

"The problem with the Church is there's people in it."

The ironic truth of this statement was not lost on me. Although I have long since forgotten what the response was too, I got the point my General Superintendent was trying to make. People are the Church. People are the business of the church. People are people. We have different viewpoints, different personalities, different understandings, and different experiences upon which we base our values. We are human and we have conflict. We may cringe at the word, we may cringe at the thought, but conflict is a reality of life together. That conflict within the Church is not something new is obvious in the letters that Paul wrote to the early churches. Healthy conflict, creative discussion can actually be a sign that a church is alive and changing to meet the needs of the congregation and the community.

Friends believe in the ministry of all believers. We are not all endowed with the same gifts, but the Spirit of God informs and empowers us to use our gifts for the good of the faith community. The word of God may come through anyone, young or old, female or male, rich or poor, educated or not, so it is important that we all learn to listen, openly and respectfully to one another. Then together, we listen for God's word for us. In a society obsessed with power and speed it is not always easy for us to take the time and patience necessary to work though conflict, to move forward together in the work of God. Sometimes I wonder if God is not more concerned about how we treat one another in the process as with the decisions we make.

The Ministry and Counsel of the local Meeting is the body charged with the general care of the spiritual welfare of the Meeting members. Often referred to as elders, not because of age, but because of the need for spiritual maturity, one of the most important tasks of the Monthly Meeting is selection of this committee. It is important that these members be sound in their own spiritual lives. It is also important that these elders be open listeners, to know the people, to be in touch with the needs of the congregation, to be able to discern the direction of God's leading. This is important in the work of assisting members to grow and mature in faith. But our ministry moves beyond our own congregation, and in listening we may ascertain the gifts that God is calling the congregation to use in ministry in the community and in the world.

Maturity in leadership is important so that we neither run from the inevitable tensions and conflicts that are a part of living together, nor become embroiled in them. Indeed, we may find that as we listen with love and respect to one another even in the midst of these seemingly discordant voices that God is showing us opportunity for ministry to our own members and moving us toward new and exciting ministries together.

I do not know much about sailing, but I do know that a sail-boat must have both a sail and a rudder. The point at which these meet is a place of much stress and tension. Without either, the sailboat cannot function, but that point of tension must be strong. For us that strength comes not in our own self, but in our faith in God.

# Friends United Meeting Minute on War on Iraq

At its February 16,2003 meeting in Richmond, Indiana, the General Board of Friends United Meeting adopted the following formal minute on the war on Iraq:

#### Friends United Meeting Minute on War on Iraq

"Be not overcome of evil, but overcome evil with good."

- Romans 12:21 KJV

"Let us then try what Love will do."

- William Penn

The government of the United States proposes to protect democracy by means of preemptive violence against the people of Iraq. Friends United Meeting calls it members - and all who know the love of God -to deny the possibility of a "just," "necessary," or "holy" war.

We believe there is another way to address issues of injustice and oppression because the root causes of injustice and oppression, such as greed, thirst for power and lack of mercy, cannot be solved through violence. We must examine our own entanglements in these roots.

Jesus shows us the way of service, humility, and non-violent intervention -substituting courageous acts of compassion for domination. The teachings of Jesus are clear: Feed the hungry, heal the sick, take care of children, love each other, forgive each other, return good for evil. In His life, His death, and His resurrection, we can see a way through our fears which is not the world's way.

The citizens of the United States continue in turmoil, affected by messages of fear and terror from all directions; we pray that they do not succumb to the temptation of believing in the security promised by military might and action. Only a false security comes through armies or weapons or creating fear -thereby hatred -in others. We recognize that following Christ's way carries risk. Yet, our experience of life under God's power keeps us on this path of love and compassion. We know that there is not -and never has been in this world -any safety except the safety that is found in hearts that have been touched and tendered by the Holy Spirit.

Friends United Meeting says to the governments and peoples of the United States, Iraq, and all the world once again, "The spirit of Christ, by which we are guided, is not changeable, so as once to command us from a thing as evil and again to move unto it; and we do certainly know, and so testify to the world, that the spirit of Christ, which leads us into all Truth, will never move us to fight and war against any man with outward weapons, neither for the kingdom of Christ, nor for the kingdoms of this world." (Declaration from Quakers to King Charles II, 1660)

## AN INFORMATION GOLD MINE FOR QUAKERS

Have you ever dedicated yourself to completing a threeyear project? If so, you know how much patience, persistence, and dedication are needed. Our F(f)riend Lloyd Patterson recently completed such a project and it is now available to all of us.

When Lloyd and Patti Patterson became custodians of the Iowa Yearly Meeting archives, they began receiving requests from persons who were researching their Quaker ancestry. In many cases, these persons wanted information about Quaker cemeteries in Iowa where their relatives might be buried.



This information was not available, so Lloyd set out to fill the gap. He contacted clerks of monthly meeting, the lowa Genealogical Society, and county historical societies. After much research, correspondence, and computer work, Lloyd compiled a data base that includes all of the burials in 80 Quaker cemeteries in lowa.

This information, which is indexed by county, is available in notebooks in the Iowa Yearly Meeting office vault. At present, 77 of the 80 counties are on a computer database available at the Oskaloosa Public Library. Contact persons are Lloyd Patterson, Linda Eliason and – at the public library, Paulette Groet.

Interesting person a information inevitably comes to light during such a project. Did you know, for example, that Hope Milhouse Hemingway (1803-1865\_, great grand-mother Of President Richard Nixon, is buried in Hickory Grove Cemetery, Cedar County? Winnie Warren, George Washington's salve, died September 16, 1884, at the age Of 116 and is buried in Bangor Friends Cemetery, Marshall County.
