



350 years is along time to take into consideration but, uniquely, I can account for a tenth of Quaker history, as I became a convinced Friend approximately 35 years ago. So, here is my "offering". I believe the "Now What?" of today is the same as it was to me 35 years ago, and is a similar question to that which George Fox wrestled with.

"But as I had forsaken the priests, as I left the Separate preachers also, and those called the most experienced people; for I saw there was none among them all that could speak to my condition. And when all my hopes in them and in all men were gone, so that I had nothing outwardly to help me, or could I tell what to do..." – George Fox

Many of you know that Fox' quote does not end there, but let's consider his words to this point before we go on. Humanity's condition is well expressed in Fox's own plight. The "condition" of humanity has not changed from the fall to the present, nor have people's feeble attempts to fill the emptiness that only God has the power to do. We ask directions from "experienced people" to guide us on life's path when all we need to do is seek THE WAY.

"then, oh! Then I heard a voice which said, 'There is one, even Christ Jesus, that can speak to thy condition'" - George Fox

The same voice which spoke to George Fox 350 years ago awaits all who seek Him. The Holy Spirit will speak to your condition; He will speak to my condition. The Holy Spirit is able to speak to anyone's condition. We don't need to "clean ourselves up before we get washed" and we can't demand that others change their condition before the Holy Spirit will speak to them. So, now what?

Among other disciplines which need to be employed, a component of our Quaker practice that will help us answer the "Now what?" is the Query.

"The purpose of the Queries is to direct attention to the true source of spiritual strength, to promote and encourage individual faithfulness to Christ, to keep the (Church)

Meeting in a healthy condition, and to cause the individual and meeting to be actively employed in a ministry acceptable to god." - *Discipline*, 8-4

Now what? Now is the time to hear God's voice as we answer the questions of our own conditions.

"Do you strive for the constant realization of God's presence in your life? Are you sensitive and obedient to the leading of the Holy Spirit? Do you endeavor to advance your spiritual growth by the prayerful study of the Bible and other devotional material?" - Discipline, 8-5

The Holy Spirit will speak to our condition. We must listen and obey.

"I believe the 'Now What?' of today is the same as it was to me 35 years ago," says Arlen.

Wars grow out of unresolved differences. Hitler used ridicule and fear to turn the Germans against the Jews. Today, the French are targets of our ridicule. We no longer eat "french" fries, but "freedom" fries. Is that a small seed of hate being planted?

Country western radio stations are now playing a patriotic anthem, "A Call to War." The lyric asks "Don't you remember how it felt that day, to see our country under fire and our people blown away? Don't you remember?" We remember! The people of Iraq are feeling that now. They too, will remember. Will a new and better life come from this season of destruction? I pray it is so.

To be a Quaker in time of war requires the vigilance of John Woolman. In his "A Plea for The Poor" he wrote, "May we look upon our treasures, the furniture of our houses, and our garments, and try whether the seeds of war have nourishment in these". In a world where the "ocean of darkness" threatens to overwhelm us, we must be planted in the ocean of light and love that overcomes the darkness".

As a mother who understands all too well the grief of burying a child, this war is felt on a very personal level. The horns of disagreement must be unlocked before the hatred, violence and greed escalate into war.

May we join together each morning to pray for the safety of our men and women, for the people of Iraq and for the peace of Christ to rule in all our hearts.

MARDI GRAS 2003

Before I went down to New Orleans for the Mardi Gras, I began studying and memorizing the beatitudes and the Sermon on the Mount. Matthew 5:10 stuck out. "Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God." I saw a friend carrying a cross and dressed like Jesus on Bourbon Street. I greeted him. He said, "I have been praying for you that you would be righteous." I fell to my knees right there under the power of God. I realized he had been praying for me, what I had not been praying for myself. When we are aware of our selfish motives and dispel them, we can see God purely.

God, Please purify my heart, so I can see You. Cleanse my heart, so I will not judge in the midst of wickedness, but see lost souls made in your image.

I met a guy who loved his guitar despite its bent neck. Later he said he could not be accepted by God because of his own sinful behavior. I asked him if he was bent. "Bent? I'm a bartender! I'm bent all the time!" I responded, "God desires to play you, and loves you when you're bent, as much as you love your bent neck guitar. Even more so, he was bent and broken for you when he died for you on the cross."

At Mardi Gras, people wear all sorts of strange costumes. Someone had rejected taking a tract from Paul, only to have a beer can get wedged into the wheel of his shopping cart. Since he couldn't getat it because of his costume, Paul removed it for him.

Lord, help us remove our costumes, masks, and the logs from our eyes. Purify our vision, and help us all accept from Christians who want to help.

Daniel is 21, and has spent years preparing to minister to punk kids on the street. One could not tell the difference between Daniel and the other street kids by their looks. He had lived with them for a week until they demanded he drink alcohol with them. When he refused, they beat him up. When other ministers at our camp saw him, they brought him back. I did not meet a rebellious young minister, but a sweet-spirited Christian young man. I told him it was an honor to eat in the same room as a person who would live and sleep in the gutters to win punk kids to Christ. He did not feel he was doing anything outstanding, or anything that Jesus did not do. Daniel is right.

On the last day - I went in and started singing right away. I put out a tambourine and people started tipping me. A street girl named Cat hassled me about taking money when I was obviously prosperous. I encouraged her to hang around and see what I did with the money. A couple came up and the Spirit moved me to ask if they were married. They had been arguing. I counseled him to

honor her by keeping his promise and I prayed for the future Mr. And Mrs. Fulmere to make it right in men's eyes as well as the Lord's.

A man who said he had traveled and played in blues bands half his life said I was very good and tipped me a few dollars. It was all I needed for my next act. I grabbed my tips and yelled to the crowd. "How many of you are sick of preachers who just want money?" I had to say it three times before I got any response. "Well I'm a preacher from lowa who loves Jesus and I'm giving away money. If you'll come up and take it out of my hands, it's yours. That's the gospel. It's free, but you have to leave the

trash you are walking in to receive Him!" I looked at Cat. She was still only five feet away, but she missed the whole thing! "I just gave my tips away, didn't you see that?" The blues man came back up to me and said, "That's the coolest thing I have every seen in my life." Cat said, "That is cool, I had judged you wrong." She went on to tell me she was from a strong legalistic religious Christian family, and had left



home because of it. I was able to share a few things and I saw her opening up, but her friends came and dragged her away against her will. This happens far too often.

A team member walked up and said, "I can't take it anymore. I need to get out of here." It is not uncommon for a Christian in this grossly sinful setting to get fed up and need to walk away from it for a while. We packed up and started walking out.

At a stoplight I saw a man who had listened to me play blues harp, thanked him for listening, and asked where he was from. "Atlanta. I am trying to get back there, but I couldn't find the guy who said he would take me to a place where I could get sober and right with God. I waited all day." "I know right where he is," I said. "It's going to be all right. In an hour you'll be fed, cleaned up and ready to go" We all cried. We had missed one, but Dwight would not miss out. We were sensitive to the Spirit's leading that we needed to leave the area, and the Spirit directed us to a hurting soul. Praise the Lord.

Finally, One preacher said, "These people have the logic and firm standards of a rubber yardstick." But God loves all of us just the way we are. He also loves us too much to leave us that way. Whenever it looks like you have missed it because your plans have gone awry, keep your spirit open to God's Spirit, and you will be right where you need to be to save someone's life.

Lord, keep my spirit pure and open to your Spirit, so I may see You move in people.

IS PEACE POSSIBLE?

We hope so...we pray so; God desires it ("If it is possible, as much as depends on you, live peaceably with all men." – Romans 12:18 NKJV). There are some situations for which we can only pray for peace, others in which we can influence for peace, and yet others in which we can determine peace.

Peacemaking is a high priority at Quakerdale. It is a part of our mission statement and throbs like a heartbeat throughout our treatment service. Our staff often serve as conciliators.

Ken Sande, author and founder of Peacemaker Ministries, says it best, "Since all of life involves relationships, and all relationships are prone to conflict, peacemaking is a key to our children's success in life (For further information, see HisPeace.org)."

It is more gratifying to assist youth in experiencing the freedom of forgiveness. The life baggage many youth bring to Quakerdale necessitate their granting of forgiveness to the offender; for others the big task is getting forgiveness from the offended – for some it is both.

The greatest expression of peacemaking is resolving one's personal conflict with God, who offers a restored relationship with Him (Now all things are of God, who has reconciled us to Himself through Jesus Christ" – II Corinthians 5:19 NKJV).

Not only is there the absence of guilt and conflict, but the presence of a calm and tranquil spirit (and the peace of God, which passes all understanding, will guard your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus"- Philippians 4:7 NKJV). Once peace and forgiveness have been received from Christ, youth can progress to resolving their relational conflicts.

A third step offers youth a prevention system. Integrating the principles of the Bible into daily living helps them learn to live free of offense ("Great peace have those who love Your law, and nothing causes them to stumble"-Psalm 119:165).

Thank you for partnering with us in our effort to bring peace to lowa's youth.
