ABOUT OUR SPEAKER

Ron Crandall is the Associate Dean of E. Stanley Jones School of World Mission & Evangelism at Asbury Theological Seminary. A member of the Asbury faculty since 1983, Dr. Crandall came to the Seminary with significant local church and denominational experience.

Dr. Crandall holds degrees from Michigan State University and Fuller Theological Seminary. An ordained elder in the Kentucky Conference of The United Methodist Church, he has pastored churches in California and Arizona. In 1977, he was appointed to The United Methodist General Board of Discipleship (Nashville, Tenn.), where he served as director of evangelism for the local church. He is a frequent speaker at seminars, workshops, and conferences.

Dr. Crandall is author of several books on the subject of evangelism with a special concern for small churches, including *Witness: Exploring and Sharing Your Christian Faith*, *The Contagious Witness: Exploring Christian Conversion*, *Turn Around Strategies for the Small Church*, *There's New Life in the Small Church*, and *The Small Membership Church: Growing, Caring, Serving*. He is an international leader in *The Upper Room's Walk to Emmaus* and has published articles on evangelism-related topics in such periodicals as *The Academy for Evangelism Journal*, *The Interpreter*, *The Asbury Herald*, and *Children's Leader*.

Friendly Flashes

Proverbs 31:20 – “She extends a helping hand to the poor and opens her arms to the needy.”

As I write this, USFW Fall Retreat has just passed, the fall harvest is in full swing and the papers are speculating on the grain prices. We can become so focused on our own profit or loss that we lose sight of how truly rich we are in this country.

At Fall Retreat, money was raised to replace a broken water heater for camp. \$110 of the \$800 came from the sale of the “old hens” that decorated the tables. These hens were the work of Angie Wetrich and the Earlham USFW. The ladies also learned that over \$800 has been raised so far for the Turkana school uniforms.

In Des Moines the week of October 12-18, the World Food Prize will be awarded. Established in 1986, the prize recognizes achievements in improving the quality, quantity or availability of food in the world. This year, Catherine Bertini, Undersecretary of the UN World Food will receive the prize for 2003. In part, she is being honored for her “discovery that by giving food directly to the women, the food gets directly to the people in need!

Friends have historically been involved in feeding the hungry and seeking to ease poverty. In 1940 with fewer than one hundred thousand members of the Society of Friends, the American Friends Service Committee led the way in relief work in Europe. American Quakers administered relief in both occupied and unoccupied war zones, feeding children who were hungry all the time.

A Quaker miller named Perry Haydon from Michigan decided to plant a cubic inch of wheat-360 kernels and to tithe a 10th. That project grew into what was called Dynamic Kernels. The wheat was harvested, processed into Ralston Relief Cereal. Friend Lucy Morgan, whose objective was to design a food that would provide the nourishment necessary to sustain life and be easily transported, developed the cereal.

As Friends, we have always recognized the abilities of women to minister equally with men. We use what we have at hand; fabric for hens or pennies for missions, always with the goal to change or enhance beyond the initial offering; school uniforms that enable a child to get an education and an adult to earn a living; hens that brighten a table and aid the work of Camp Quaker Heights; Food to those in need, to restore health and dignity. Over seven hundred thousand fed by women, with food provided by U.N. programs, and still - babies are dying of starvation in Africa, orphaned and abandoned in the AIDS epidemic.

Yes, we are indeed rich in this country. As Friends Women, we have a rich heritage to celebrate and to continue. Proverbs 31:29 “There are many virtuous and capable women in the world, but you surpass them all.”

This Thanksgiving, I give thanks for all of you and work you are continuing, you are greatly to be praised.



This Endowment seeks to honor the Picketts, Penn alumni and distinguished AFSC leaders, by encouraging young Quaker potential leaders through grants for service projects.

January 15th is the deadline for receiving nominations for the year 2004. If the emerging leader and his/her intended project fit the Pickett Fund guidelines, he/she is promptly notified and invited to complete an application form.

During March, the trustees receive copies of all applications and independently rank applicants according to the Funds' goals. In April the trustees finalize selections. Cumulative requests are always larger than available resources but the 2003 grants totaled six and ranged from \$1,500 to \$3,000 for a total of \$12,000.
