That is the secret to being a missionary, that great all encompassing love that carries us beyond what we alone could envision and out into the world as His light.

William Penn, in SOME FRUITS OF SOLITUDE put it this way, "Let us today, therefore, hear his voice, and not burden our hearts; who speaks to us many ways. In the scriptures, in our hearts, but his servants and his providences; and the sum of all is holiness and charity."

What ever is going on in your lives right now, do not burden your heart but instead stay in that "ocean of light" which proceeds from God and see, and hear Him speak to us out of the circumstances that surround us at this very moment. May we all arrive at Spring Conference centered and refreshed by our time spent listening for His voice and open to hearting where God has been at work in the lives and ministry of the Whiteheads.
