## Joseph John Gurney

continued

Last month I finished by saying I wanted to do further reading about Joseph John Gurney. Partly because I wanted to know more about the person that many would say the Iowa Yearly Meeting of Friends (FUM) is the outcome of.

Joseph was born in 1788 in England to a well to do banking family. The youngest child and a brother of Elizabeth Fry who was another famous Quaker. Joseph was educated by private tutors in Oxford and was apparently a very good student. At the age of 25 he wrote about his convictions pertaining to Christianity and essentials to his faith. Later, he wrote much more and traveled throughout England, Scotland and Ireland in support of his sister Elizabeth's work in reference to reform within the prison and asylum establishments of that day.

Joseph was quite active in the anti-slavery movement in England and eventually in America. What he became most noted for was the encouragement of establishing "Bible Societies" in England and eventually North America.

In the late 1830's he traveled for three years in America speaking whenever and wherever given the opportunity. Friends Meetings and sometimes other facilities or churches were utilized to host large gatherings that came to hear. Joseph spoke in the Congress as well as the Whitehouse and had private meetings with President Van Buren. Those topics had much to do with abolishing slavery, but it also included addresses about how Quakerism was a Christian society. There had already been one major split in North American Quakers and another one followed about the same time of his death in 1845. I want to share with all of you, what Joseph John Gurney wrote in 1813, which I believe motivated him to travel and speak so widely. The following is an excerpt from Memories of J.J. Gurney.

Let thy moderation be known unto all men. The Lord is at hand. Present thy body "a living sacrifice, holdy and acceptable unto God." Judge not, lest thou be

judged. Never expose the faults and infirmities of others, except for a decidedly good purpose. Let it be thy general rule, never to mention what is amiss in thy neighbour to a third person, until thou has been faithful in communicating thy sentiments to the individual himself.

Be in love and charity with all. Lov "thinketh no evil," and speaketh no evil, "is not puffed up, and is kind." Be kind in sentiment, kind in manner, kind in action; yet away with all ostentation. In all things let self be absed. Be willing to suffer for Jesus Christ's sake. His word will be "a lamp unto thy feet and a light unto they path." Watch for his guidance, follow it with a firm and manly step; dewll deep in the power of his love; live not to thyself, but live as Christ liveth in thee.

Had I been during the whole course of my life perfectly obedient to the Divine law, I should still be an unprofitable servant, without surplus of merit. But since, on the contrary, I have grievously offended in many particulars, I not only deserve no favour, but have become subject to God's just wrath. Under the effects of this just wrath I believe I must have fallen, had not God provided for me a way of escape in his own free pardoning grace, through the sufferings, death, and sacrifice of his Son Jesus Christ.

I believe that God hath appointed this sacrifice, in its mature propitiatory, as the means of atonement or reconciliation, and that he hath therein at once displayed his mercy to the sinner and his judgment upon sin. This pardoning of sinners for Christ's sake is what I understand by the term "justification."

In order to partake of these mercies, I believe I must possess a living faith, which shall lead me, first, to place my whole hope of acceptance with God in the merits of my Redeemer; and secondly, to obey the dictates of the Holy Spirit, whom Christ has sent to bring me to repentance, to purge me from all sin, and to guide me in the way to life eternal. This work of the Spirit, by which we become freed from, sin, born again, new creatures, is what I understand by the term "sanctification." These two, justification and sanctification, I believe to be necessary and sufficient for the salvation of my soul – the first, the cause—the second, the condition; both the result of the grace of God, in Christ Jesus my Lord.

I hope many of you were able to attend Fall Retreat. The cooler days of Autumn are fast approaching and soon we will be shut inside against the cold. For those of us who now live in town, a day in the country is always a treat. I have been watching the squirrels and the chipmunks scurrying about gathering nuts and seeds for winter. The chipmunks are so cute as they fly about with their little tails stuck straight up in the air. God instilled in these animals the need to prepare for the changes to come, and so we too, must make preparations for a changing world.

As we gathered at Quaker Heights to hear about the "Call to Ministry", we were reminded again that it takes all of us. Ministry is not done in a vacuum, but rather in the world around us. We are called to be in the world but not of the world. We each have the ability to minister as Tabitha did, by doing kind deeds and helping others. This can be done only when we go into the world to see the needs of others. When we sit in our "steeple houses" and keep apart from the world, we do not recognize the needs of others.

Jesus traveled about and mixed with the people much to the consternation of the religious leaders of His day. That is how he came to see and recognize the poverty of the people, both spiritually and physically. He offered them his help for both kinds of poverty. By touching the places where there is physical need, we come into fellowship and are then able to minister to the greater need. The need for Living Water, which is at the heart of most of our pain and sense of despair. The world is quick to point out our shortcomings, but Jesus came to take us into His family and to wipe out all of our despair and shortcomings.

May we take the lessons we learned at Fall Retreat home with us and make preparations to use our skills in the world around us. The world outside our churches where the love of Christ is not yet known and understood. The world where darkness can prevail until we take our light, the light of Christ and dispel the darkness.


### OPEN WORSHIP
