Earlham School of Religion

ESR Access is offering a continuing education course, "Christian Reconciliation: Conflict Resolution in Church and World".

DATES: January 3-16, 2005

ESR Access is the distributed education program of Earlham School of Religion. This course is an introductory exploration of the personal, spiritual and practical aspects of conflict resolution. We will use self-assessment instruments to learn our own ways of approaching conflict and how we can become more personally prepared to do conflict resolution informally or seek further training as a mediator. We will examine the biblical teachings on Christian reconciliation to learn how important reconciliation was to the early Church. Finally, we will learn a model of conflict resolution and apply this model in role-play situations.

No prior training or experience in conflict resolution is required and not prior graduate work is needed to enroll for graduate credit. To receive credit, students will need to do daily reading, participate in role-plays, present reports to the class, and complete a book review after the course meeting conclude.

ESR Access is an accredited program leading to the M.Div. or M.A. degrees. Tuition is \$834 per course plus fees (\$35 application, \$90 registration & \$50 technology). Qualified applicants, who are not interested in taking the course for credit but want the education, may audit the course for only \$225 plus fees. Number of auditing students may be limited.
