Historical FUM Meeting in Kenya

Over a year ago, the North American members of the Friends United Meeting General Board started making plans for a first-time-ever meeting with representatives of the East African yearly meetings. As it turned out, on February 9 and 10, representatives from twenty-four yearly meetings and affiliate bodies, FUM staff and mission staff of Friends United Meeting, and guests totaled eighty-one people who met in Kakamega, Kenya as a Global General Board. We regret that six member yearly meetings were unable to attend.

Prior to the meeting, the North Americans traveled for visitation among a few of the Kenyan and Uganda churches. We worshiped with Friends at Ngong Road in Nairobi. We visited at Kaimosi and Lugulu Hospitals, and at the Kakamega USFW-sponsored orphanage, and we visited churches and schools in Uganda. After the board meeting, we attended the dedication of the new meetinghouse on the campus of Friends Theological College. Then our big group divided into smaller groups. Some spent several days in the Turkana area. Some visited in Samburu. A few stayed in Kaimosi and worked at the hospital.

We learned first hand about the challenges to the ministry due to lack of water and food resources, difficulties in transportation, and the wide-spread poverty conditions of the people. We also learned first hand about the hope and enthusiasm of the African Friends, their love for hearing the word of God, and their respect for the Americans who have been coming for over a hundred years to share the love of Christ. We learned there are now over 2000 Friends Churches in East Africa, mostly in the Western Province. There are also 200 secondary schools and around 1500 primary schools supported by the local Friends Churches. We learned that the Quakers in Africa are respected throughout the country and many hold state leadership positions.

The first day of the General Board meeting was devoted to the continuation of the Strategic Planning Process that was begun at the June 2006 meeting. Groups who had been formed to develop goals and strategies in the areas of Administration, Communication, Evangelism and Identity at the October meeting were asked to review and revise their plans with the help and insight of the African members. By the business meeting on Saturday, the strategic plan had been groomed for acceptance as a work in progress. It was noted by the clerk that the plan could not be approved in its final form because it will be reviewed and revised annually to guide the work of the organization. *continued on page 3*

Illegal Immigration-Solutions: Part 1 of 3

Imagine for a moment that you live in a small farming community in Mexico. While you work very hard on your land, the area is very arid and your farm is very small making it difficult to raise enough food to feed your family. You want to send one of your children to secondary school so they can be educated; however, the closest secondary school is located in a community an hour and a half away. You will need to cover the costs of lodging, food, books, and school uniforms. What should you do?

You decide your best option is to leave for the United States where you can earn money to send home to your family. You borrow \$1,600 dollars and hire a guide to take you into the United States. Your wages at your job are \$450 per week. You live in an apartment with eight other people and take turns paying for rent, food, utilities, etc. After you earn your first paycheck, you are stopped by a group of people from your neighborhood who threaten to beat you up unless you give them money. You end up giving them \$50 dollars out of every paycheck. You would go to the police, but you are an illegal immigrant. This is the real story of Victor Reyes Deramona from an article from the November/December 2006 Issue of A Common Place. He lives in Teticic, Mexico with his wife and 10 children.

Illegal Immigration has recently come to the forefront as a hot-button political issue. Congress has approved spending millions to build a fence on the Mexican boarder. There are plans to expand the boarder guard, and the INS has recently engaged in some high profile raids of companies suspicioned to have hired illegal immigrants. While these efforts may slow down the flow of illegal immigration into the United States, most people recognize that they will not solve the problem. The real problem is caused by economic conditions in the countries that illegal immigrants come from. In order to stop the flow of illegal immigration, these economic conditions must be addressed.

You can be part of the solution through Micro-Lending and Fair Trade. In Victor's community micro-credit has been used to bring hope. Mennonite Central Committee provided a small loan to the farmers to start a greenhouse where they are able to grow chile peppers. Peppers sell for a higher price then other crops and allow the farmers to make a decent living making it possible for people to stay in the community (Common 11). Perhaps one day the community might even be able to build their own secondary school. Next month another article will follow discussing the benefits of micro-lending and how you can help. Historical Meeting in Kenya

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In the Identity Focus Group's sessions, both in October and at this meeting, there were long and loving deliberations about the existing diversity of our member yearly meetings. Prompted by concerns about the FUM personnel policy that requires employees to be married or celibate, some yearly meetings have encouraged continuing dialogue about sexual ethics whereas others have asked that the issue be put to rest. With the input of the Africans, the voice for the latter seemed overwhelming. and with the affirmation of the Richmond Declaration of Faith by most of the attending yearly meeting representatives, a few Friends came away feeling that FUM was trying to push their yearly meetings out of membership. However, affirming the Richmond Declaration is not set as a requirement for membership and the freedom to remain in FUM without such affirmation still exists. Also, there are parts of the strategic plan still in place to channel some continued discussions.

Lynnville Friends sponsored a mission trip to Texas/ Mexico in February. There was all sorts of work to be done on both sides of the border. They went to serve at Melody Lane Christian Renewal Center and Texas Rose in Texas.


