

Friends Disaster Service Work Opportunities!

Calling all carpenters, plumbers, electricians and wannabes. Once again, lowa Yearly Meeting has the opportunity to cooperate with Eastern Region FDS in repairing hurricane and storm damaged homes in Indiana. This is an opportunity to not only help people who have suffered severe damage to their homes and lives, but also to meet and work with Friends from other parts of the country in a common rebuilding task. The usual procedure is to travel to the work site on Saturday and/or Sunday, work Monday through Friday, and then start home Saturday morning.

- 490 miles from Oskaloosa. 7-8 hours estimated driving time. From March 29 - April 17th of 2009 our focus again turns to Columbus, IN. Last fall we successfully completed over 2,100 man hours in three weeks of work there and 15 families were able to return to their homes. More than 5000 houses and businesses near Columbus were flooded in the storms early last spring. There is still much to be done.

The Sandcreek-Azalia Friends Church 12 miles south will be our "bunkhouse". Pastor C. G. White and his entire congregation were most hospitable during our last stay and has invited us to return. United Way has a huge list of needy addresses in Columbus, IN.

Ross Leversee, age 97, of LeGrand Friends, died on Sunday, December 21, 2008 at Villa Del Sol in Marshalltown. Funeral services were held Wednesday, December 24 at a local funeral home. Ross and his late wife, Nina, moved to Marshalltown and finally LeGrand in the 1950's because of his employment as a tool and die maker with Lennox Industries. He loved to work crossword puzzles, propagated beautiful gardens, and was known for his friendly smile as he walked around town. He is survived by two nieces and several cousins.

Jennie Latham, age 86, of LeGrand Friends, died on Monday, December 22, 2008 at Marshalltown Medical and Surgical Center. Funeral services were held Saturday, December 27 at LeGrand Friends Church. Jennie and her husband, Ernie, lived and worked in the Marshalltown and LeGrand areas all their married lives (except for two years in Texas with Lennox.) She loved to cook, sew, quilt, crochet, do craft work and go camping. She was active in the LeGrand community through the church, the USFW, and the LeGrand Lioness Club. She is survived by her husband, Ernie; two daughters; one son; six grandchildren; and three great-grandchildren.

Paul D. Hemingway, age 51, of West Branch Friends, died on January 22, 2009 from complications of recurrent leukemia. Born March 7, 1957, in Iowa City, he was a son of Elmer and Lucille Dahlgren Hemingway. Growing up on the family farm near Oasis, he graduated from West Branch High School in 1965 and later received his bachelor's degree in Agronomy from Iowa State University. While at Iowa State he met Donna Towers, whom he married December 14, 1985. Paul worked briefly as an ag consultant and driver for Johnson County SEATS. He farmed the family farm for 24 years, establishing a reputation for careful stewardship of the soil and wildlife under his care. He was a member of the West Branch Friends Church and participated in service trips to Cuba with the Friends United Meeting. He enjoyed canoeing and camping and took several trips to the Boundary Waters with friends and the scouts. He kept the scout bus running, as his father had before him. Paul was known for his love of jazz music. motorcycling, flying his ultralight plane, camping with his family and his ability to fix just about anything. Survivors include his wife, Donna; children, Jon, Emily and Loren, all of rural lowa City; grandson, Felix Harwood Green of Iowa City; father, Elmer Hemingway; 4 sisters, and 2 brothers.

We have long desired to join God's work among the nations. From early life fascination with missionaries, to short-term trips as youth, to formal mission studies in college and seminary, God has been growing in us an excitement about His love for all the peoples of the earth.

Through prayerful consideration we have turned our focus to the Khmer people of Cambodia. The Khmer Rouge Genocide of the late 1970's has left this people and their nation in a place of brokenness. We long for the light of Christ and the sure hope of the gospel to bring healing and restoration to these precious people, knowing that God often uses the weak and broken of this world to shine His glory. Many of them have never even had a chance to hear the gospel message.

With God's help, we are currently in the process of building a partnership team to link arms with us in reaching the Khmer people. We are in need of both prayer and financial partners to make this ministry effective, sustainable, and even possible. From.....Nurse Judy Davis Kiamosi Hospital, Kenya

One of the hospital activities that I love to participate in is the mobile outreach clinics. In the month of March we will go to places like Chepkumia, Kobiem, Chebara and Koitabut. I have been to all of these locations except Chepkumia. If you asked me to take you to one of the sites, we would still be wandering around for days. I can assure you that the ride to and from is very uncomfortable. Mostly because the car that should only seat four holds six along with all of the equipment and supplies for the outreach.

The hospital staff that generally provides service is Phanice Mandasio, Senior Maternal Child Health (MCH) Nurse, a young clinical officer (CO), a VCT (Voluntary Counseling and Testing) counselor, a pharmacist technician, the driver, and me. My job is to register people and take their vital signs. If the driver is free he helps me with registration because getting peoples' names spelled correctly is challenging. My Swahili lessons have helped me a great deal but not that much. I take their vital signs and send them to the CO or to MCH where pregnant women get an antenatal check-up or the child is to get an immunization. The CO usually writes a script for medication and the MCH nurse might send a woman for multivitamins or iron tablets. The pharmacist will fill the prescription and try to get a little money from the patient to pay for the medications. The VCT counselor works on his/her own and counsels and tests people with the rapid HIV test. The VCT counselor also tests pregnant women and children for HIV. We all have our jobs and we can help each other out which is often necessary.

We saw 129 people in Kobiem and 99 in Chebara. We worked through the day not stopping for a break. We were exhausted, dusty and hungry by late day. Why do we do the outreaches? The main reasons are because public transportation is not available and the cost is too much for many of these people. We found an aunt who had five children of her own and she was raising four children of her brother and sister-in-law because they both had died. The youngest child was two years of age and very sick. We tested this child and she was HIV+. We asked the aunt to bring the four children to Kaimosi to enroll in the CCC. I have seen her three times at events at the CCC with the children. The two year old is very active and fun to watch. I believe that without the outreach clinic we might not have reached these children in time to help them live as fully as they are able to with proper services and antiretroviral medications.

I'm signed up for four clinics in March. There are always wonderful stories to share like finding the 100 year old woman in Kobiem. I stopped everything and took her photo. Everyone was laughing and watching me. They told me to give her a present. The only thing I had was gum so I gave her a pack. She had no teeth but the gum was soft. She told everyone it was very sweet and she took another stick. She was so happy the rest of the day chewing her gum.


