Now it begins to show up in our churches and amongst our friends and families. Loss of patience and unrealistic expectations translates, in my estimation, to diverting our frustrations onto something or someone. We shouldn't be surprised. But we must not lose our faith or our hope.

As the apostle Paul wrote to the Romans, it is times like these can be used as a tool in the shaping of our character and in the end making us more Christ-like.

Eugene Peterson, in his book titled "A Long Obedience in the Same Direction" p. 134, "The reason my childhood was one enthusiasm after another was that I hadn't yet found an organizing center for my life and a goal that would demand my all and my best. The Christian faith is the discovery of that center in the **God who sticks with us,** the righteous God. Christian discipleship is a decision to walk in his ways, steadily and firmly, and the finding that the way integrates all our interests, passions and gifts, our human need and our eternal aspirations. It is the way of life we were created for. There are endless challenges in it to keep us on the growing edge of faith; there is always the **God who sticks with us** to make it possible for us to persevere."

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Peace and Social Concerns Committee 2009 Yearly Meeting Project

Update on the Mukuyu Village Friends Widows Project-2008

Last year the Peace and Social Concerns Committee took on a new venture. We asked the Yearly Meeting to fund a project of Right Sharing of World Resources (RSWR), a Friends organization committed to poverty alleviation through microlending projects. The Peace and Social Concerns Committee would like to update you on the progress of this project. The Yearly Meeting raised \$2002.

The women purchased beans, maize, and chicks with the money from Right Sharing of World Resources. Loans were made to thirteen of their members to start additional small businesses. Loans were to be repaid to the Widow's group every ten months at 2% interest.

The Mwenyelizi Friends Women's Group - (RSWR)

The project involves thirty women from Mbihi/ Wamuluma Village Meeting, Vihiga Yearly Meeting. This is a one-year project. The women advocate for preservation and planting of indigenous trees. Their project involves the sale of firewood, kerosene, fingerling fish and starting a tree farm. Peace and Social Concern's goal is for the Yearly Meeting Churches to sponsor this project. To fully fund the project we would need to raise \$4,450. Please consider donating and encouraging your meeting to participate.
