Jesus, A Refugee

We don't often dwell on the second part of Matthew Chapter 2. We talk a lot about the Wise Men who came from afar with their gifts for the Christ child. We revel in their worship of the new born king. But we don't spend much time reflecting that Jesus and his parents became refugees fleeing to a foreign land to escape the hatred and persecution of King Herod. Nor does the Bible say much about how long they were in Egypt, but scholars speculate that Jesus and his parents stayed in Egypt from one year to seven.

As a Family Advocate with Drake University Head Start, I serve many refugee families. Their lives are not easy. Many of them are far from their family and friends. They are isolated by language and customs. But they have come here to find a better place to raise their families. They have been driven out of their home lands by war and hopeless poverty. They, like Jesus parents, are doing their best to provide a safe environment for their children to thrive.

This year I have worked with Iraqi families, Sudanese, Somalian, Vietnamese, Kenyan, Liberian and more Latin American families than I can recount. As a home visitor, I do not always feel my help is welcomed. But my refugee families are grateful for the help that they receive, and their hospitality is exemplary.

A couple of months ago, I went to the home of an Iraqi family whose child was recently accepted into the Home Based Head Start program. I was treated as an honored guest. A meal had been prepared to share with me. The apartment was spotless. Everyone was dressed in their best clothing. I had already eaten, and it is against Head Start policy for a number of reasons to eat meals with our clients. But I could see clearly, that it would be rude and unkind to not accept their hospitality. Therefore, I sat at their table and set aside my agenda to return their welcome.

I have thought a lot about the way we in the United States receive refugees. Many see new people as a threat to their jobs, neighborhood and sense of security. As a result, the refugees or immigrants are treated as intruders. Is this how the Egyptians treated Jesus and his parents, or were they honored as welcome guests who were bringing a great gift to the world?

One thing that many in the United States seem to forget is that all of us came here as a refugee or immigrant. Only the Native Americans were already here.

Hospitality and generosity are at the core of Christian love. Hebrews 13:1&2 tells us, "Keep on loving each other as sisters and brothers. Do not forget to entertain strangers, for by so doing some have entertained angels."

In today's economy people from other countries are not the only refugees. There are people displaced by Katrina, and there are many people who have lost their jobs and are moving around the U.S. seeking jobs. Funds are being cut to help all of these people.

I encourage us all to reach out and get to know the refugees in our community; welcoming them as joyfully as we would welcome Jesus and his parents. In so doing we are welcoming God's presence.

New Playground Equipment

It is time to work on raising funds to replace the playground equipment. After many years of use by

the children the equipment needs to updated and replaced. The oldest pieces of equipment came with the grounds when it was bought nearly 21 years ago. The next pieces were added about ten years ago. So it is time to replace all the pieces. The new equipment will be designed for use by all ages. Cost for equipment is as follows:

Prime Time	\$37,500
GT Events	2,700
Mulch	1,650
Installation	11,150
Total	\$53,000

A contractor will give a 50% matching gift to help with cost. Therefore, the cost is only \$32,900.

IAYM MISSION'S FOCUS FOR MAY PEACE CURRICULUM

Following the post-election violence in Kenya in late 2007, John Muhanji, Africa Ministries Representative, came to the United States with a deep burden. Would writers come forward to prepare a peacemaking curriculum for elementary and high school students? George Fox University responded and in collaboration with the Kenya Teachers' Service Commission is preparing materials that will soon be used through all Kenyan High Schools.

In Iowa, Charlotte Stangeland, education professor at William Penn University, felt led to use her expertise in writing peacemaking materials for primary school children. Marlene Pedigo and Mary Glenn Hadley have joined her in writing lessons from 2nd – 8th grade.

In Kenya, Jackson Alwena became the coordinator for this project. In the summer of 2009, Charlotte Stangeland and Sandy Davis met with Kenyan educators to listen and learn together how this curriculum could be put together effectively for use in Kenyan primary schools. The writing has followed the guidelines of the Kenyans. They titled the curriculum Peace in a Community. In the summer of 2010, another meeting is scheduled where the Kenyan educators will edit the material. It will be followed with teacher training for the projected 3000 teachers involved. It is hoped that materials will be available to the 1500 Friends-sponsored primary schools for use by January, 2011. Nine hundred thousand lives could be impacted in one year with this biblically-based peace curriculum.

It has become evident that this material could be used by Friends around the world for Sunday School as well as in the Kenya classrooms. It is available on the Web site link from the FUM home page (www. fum.org) where the Peace in a Community can be downloaded for use.



Key concepts for the primary curriculum include

- Skills for Peacemaking
