Last week while listening to a news story, either from PBS or CBS I can't remember which, the announcer was commenting on how one party is trying to take control of the Congress, both representatives and senators in the next election, but that the President would continue to have control of the 'bully pulpit'. This struck a chord within me, and so I looked up the phrase and found that Theodore Roosevelt was the first to coin it. It meant that the President was the person who was setting the tone of the government and had the freedom to try and direct the country and its legislation. I thought of this 'pulpit' control in a different light. From my current studies I am learning the importance of hearing and understanding the people we come in contact with in our churches. Additionally, how we need to be intentionally coming in contact with the people in our communities if we ever hope to have impact on their lives as the church. Robert Lewis, in his book *The Church of Irresistible Influence speaks in a question that asks, are we willing to be present with the people before we proclaim to the people?* *Doctrinal purity (Lewis and Wilkins, p. 24) has gone by the wayside for political correctness or so focused on solely preaching the word with a certain degree of anger yet not practicing practical ministries that the world sees the church as uncaring. (Herriges, 2014, Barclay College Essay, Unpublished) One of my classmates wrote this sentence in his essay a week ago. Again, I was struck with the thought, is this something really important for me and Iowa Yearly Meeting, or is it just because I am being influenced by my studies?*

Here is my current understanding, if we preach for doctrinal purity and truth without demonstrating love for the people in and of all walks of life, then how do we hope to bring them in, convert them and change them? "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life" (John 3:16, NASB). If I want to reach them, they must see the love of God demonstrated not just proclaimed. In our society that has been so immersed in media coverage of the failings of the church leaders over the last three decades why would the unknowing want to risk coming in? We must go out onto the highways and byways and seek them where they are, not what we want them to become! Some who read this article might be asking themselves, how can I do this, I am too old "my day has come and gone". However, I ask is there anyone who cannot pray and financially support new efforts to reach out, rather than looking longingly to the past and hoping we will go back to our yesteryear memories? Hope is for the future, think of how our ancestors prayed, worked and sacrificed that we might have a hope and a future.

Missions Focus on Tanzania

Friends are building a new meeting house in southern Tanzania at Kyela. People have a vision for this building to become a place where a Yearly Meeting will develop, reaching out to northern Zambia and Malawi, where they have already made connections, as well as a place where encouragement, training, and discipleship happens. With any vision toward advancing the gospel comes great opposition. We are warned in 1 Peter 5:8: "Be self-controlled and alert. Your enemy the devil prowls around like a roaring lion looking for someone to devour."

Villages surrounding Kyela donated rice to be sold in an effort to provide funds for the Kyela church. Sale of the rice was estimated to raise \$750, but the rice prices plummeted before it was sold. When Ron Bryan our IAYM superintendent went to Tanzania he was asked to take the rice to Kenya or the United States to sell. Transportation was a large and costly obstacle, the rice could spoil before it would be sold at a favorable price, and the people in the surrounding areas were in need of food. Thus an alternative idea developed. IA Friends meetings, groups, and /or individuals would cover the value of the rice collected, and then the Kyela people would give it to those in need in the community. (Ron Bryan wrote an article about this in the "The Iowa Friend", and money has been donated to complete the rice project through the IAYM Mission Board.)

To complete the meeting house in Kyela \$22,000 will need to be raised. We expect that they will work to raise a large portion of that amount, but we are challenged with Paul's words to the early church in Philemon 1:4-7. "I always thank my God as I remember you in my prayers, because I hear about your faith in the Lord Jesus and your love for all the saints. I pray that you may be active in sharing your faith, so that you will have a full understanding of every good thing we have in Christ. Your love has given me great joy and encouragement, because you, brother, have refreshed the hearts of the saints."

It is time to show our brothers and sisters in Tanzania we will not forget them or what they are trying to do, and to refresh their hearts with encouragement.

On May 10, at 6:30 p.m. in Oskaloosa at William Penn University's MTC building, there will be an event, organized by Sarah Radcliff to focus on worship of our Lord Jesus Christ, and to pray for our brothers and sisters in Kyela, Tanzania. Together we can praise God for the work that has started, and the believers that are stepping out in faith, and asking Him for:

- the Holy Spirit to burn in the hearts of the believers, for Christ to be glorified in the lives of our Tanzanian brothers and sisters, and seen by others, and their ministry to be fruitful.
- the eyes of those who do not know the truth to be opened, and their hearts receptive and repentant.

- Kyela to be a church which stands on a hill, that people will see and know what direction they need to go to reach the light. "You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden. Nor do people light a lamp and put it under a basket, but on a stand, and it gives light to all in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in heaven." Matthew 5:14-16.
- the surrounding community to recognize this to be a church where training, equipping and encouragement happen.
- the courage, protection and obedient perseverance against spiritual warfare for this church and other believers. A love offering will also be taken toward the new church building in Kyela, Tanzania as an encouragement to our brothers and sisters there. Please spread the word to your youth groups and Bible studies and pray how God might lead you and your meetings to help in encouraging Southern Tanzania.

We might also pray that a team from Iowa Yearly Meeting might be formed to travel to Kyela, Tanzania to participate in the dedication of the completed building, projected for fall, 2015. This team may also work on a new meeting house as well. Details for this opportunity will be developed as more information comes to us. Preparation for this entire work requires much prayer from all of us.

April 2nd Children's Book Day: Celebrate by giving a new book to a child, donating one to your church library, or a shelter or after school program. Most importantly read to a child. If you don't have a child in your home, ‘borrow’ a neighbor's or visit a library and take a seat in the kids section. Before long you will find a little one who would be happy to hear you read a story to them. Instilling a love of reading promotes a lifetime of learning and enjoyment.



The candidate shall be a participating member of Iowa Yearly Meeting.

A candidate from Iowa Yearly Meeting shall have successfully completed secondary education requirements and shall have been accepted by William Penn University.

Applications must be received by April 14, 2014.

To be considered for a scholarship for the succeeding academic year, recipients must submit a request to the committee each year.

Scholarships shall only be awarded for a maximum of four (4) academic years.


