## Focus on Lindi School



In 2012, Western Yearly Meeting's Board on Outreach chose Lindi School as their special project and succeeded in raising over $\$ 13,000$. Although the school has so many pressing and immediate expenses to meet, the school board decided to use this surprise gift to invest in the future.

Lindi School is located in Kibera Slum in Nairobi, a severely-overcrowded squatter's settlement. Obtaining new land for development is not possible. However, the number of parents requesting to enroll their children continues to grow. Therefore, Lindi School Board decided to use that gift to add a second story to their building in order to accommodate the larger school population.

Kibera Slum is crammed with informal and haphazard buildings; and a second story addition was a rather dramatic choice to make. Whith the building complete, Lindi School has added three new classrooms and a multipurpose hall to the campus. It was a bold choice to build for the future. The school board believes that through education and a safe environment the children of the slum could aspire to great heights.

Ardith (Ardee)Snell Talbot, 81, died Tuesday, June 3, 2014, after an intense battle with squamous cell carcinoma. She was born March 11, 1933 to Howard and Dolly Snell and grew up in Juniata, Nebraska. She graduated from Juniata High School and Kearney State University with a BA in Secondary Education. She was a semi-pro softball player in Nebraska in the 1950's, serving as her team's catcher. She taught English and drama and directed many church plays and cantatas. Later she owned and operated Christian bookstores in Southerland, Mason City and Marshalltown, Iowa, and retired in 1997 as the Editor of Friends United Press in Richmond, Indiana.

Ardee was a Christ follower and avid people person. She was known as the Hat Lady in her later years, speaking widely through out the Midwest. In her talks the theme was, "Have a Blast While You Last,"and she spoke about the healing effects of humor while using many hats to engage the audience in laughter. She also enjoyed sports, theater, card games, music, books, and most of all, her children and grandchildren. She was a great cheerleader, attending many concerts, games, and productions of those that she loved.

She was married to Richard (Dick) Talbot, her husband of 59 years. She is survived by her husband Dick, Eldora, lowa, sons Richard (Darlene) Talbot of Winston-Salem, North Carolina, and Robert (Jennifer) Talbot of New Providence lowa, brother Robert (June) Snell of Wichita, Kansas, and grandchildren Caitlin Talbot and Cayla Talbot of Phoenix, AZ, Heather Talbot of Minneapolis, MN, Daniel, Holly, Thomas, Matthew, and Charlie Talbot of New Providence, Iowa, step grandchildren Max Kerr and Arielle Kerr of Winston-Salem NC, and great granddaughter Lindsey Kerr of Winston-Salem, NC. She was the beloved aunt of several special nieces and nephews. She was preceded in death by her parents, brothers Charles and John(Jack) Snell, sister Alice, and infant son Edward Talbot.

Brittany graduated from East Marshall High School on May 17, 2014 and will continue her education at Marshalltown Community College this fall to pursue a degree in Nursing to fulfill her passion to help others.

    Brittney's involvement in LeGrand Friends Church spans her middle school and high school years with her participation in Youth Group. During that time, she has been involved in a variety of service activities that the Youth Group performed. She also volunteered by helping and teaching at Pioneer Clubs (LFC's mid-week children's program), as well as Vacation Bible School.
