Missions Moment Dale Graves



Dale Graves of FUM met with the Iowa Yearly Meeting Mission Board and other interested Friends at Grinnell Friends Church on Nov 23. Dale is spending a year in Belize working with the Belize Friends School and exploring other op-

portunities for Friends ministries in Belize.

His talk was very informative and enlightening. Education in Belize is modeled after the British educational system. Grade school is available to many students, but admission to High School requires passing a very rigorous test. As Belize High Schools only have room for about 50% of the students of eligible age, many do not meet the standards for admission, and simply spend their days on the streets, seeking ways to obtain a little money for food and other necessities.

The Belize Friends School exists to help students who have not passed the test learn the necessary information to be able to pass and be admitted to High School. As education in Belize is not wide-spread, many young people do not see any necessity for it. Belize is a very poor country, with much corruption and lawlessness.

At present there are 18 students enrolled. There is room for several more. The school has started a soccer team this year, which the students greatly enjoy. They have also recently purchased a bus, so they can take all the students to games and on field trips in one vehicle.

Starting in January, Dale will facilitate several conference calls with the Belizean school board and several interested Friends in the US to discuss possibilities for expanding the school and perhaps taking on new ministries. Your prayers for this endeavor are much appreciated.

NOTE: The Barbers' financial account with FUM is still in arrears, as contributions to their support has not met all the necessary expenses. As FUM has advanced these funds, it is necessary that they be repaid. So we need to continue to make contributions to FUM for this cause. Any funds sent to the Iowa Yearly Meeting Mission Board will be forwarded to FUM to help erase this deficit. Thank you for your prayers and continued support for all of our mission projects.

Ruth Muriel (Street) Weinmann May 6, 1926—July 22, 2014

Hesper Friends Meeting would like to express their appreciation for the life of Ruth Weinmann. Ruth was the daughter of Granville and Avis (Hawks) Street and grew up in the Hesper community and Hesper Friends Meeting. After her marriage to Vernon Weinmann, December 27, 1948, work took them to other locations. When Vernon retired, they returned to Hesper and the Friends Meeting. Ruth was active in the Hesper Friends Women group (USFW), served on Ministry and Counsel, the Missions and Christian Ed committees, and helped with other Meeting responsibilities. She was always willing to help with projects, both in the church and in the community, and sewed many lap robes for the VFW. She was the primary caregiver for her mother during her mother's last years and also cared for her aunt and uncle after her mother's passing. Ruth will always be remembered for her willingness to help others and the Meeting. Hesper Friends appreciate her ministry among us and commend her to the loving care of her Lord.

Robert L. Street, 75, of Hesper, died Saturday, Nov. 15, 2014, at the Winneshiek Medical Center in Decorah. Robert was born December 28, 1938, to Leroy and Lueda (Brenna) Street. He attended the Hesper School through 8th grade and graduated from the Mabel High School in 1956. He went on to graduate from William Penn College in 1960. He married Clista Joyce Rose November 13, 1960, at the Christiansburg United Methodist Church near Ottumwa. Robert had started working in carpentry on his time off from college and continued with that after they were married. He worked for Lloyd Foltz until 1974, when he began working at Luther College in Decorah as a carpenter and locksmith. He worked at Luther until July 22, 1999, when he was paralyzed in an auto accident. His injury didn't prevent him from participating in activities at the Hesper Friends Meeting, where he was a life long member, and the Hesper Public Cemetery. Robert was a member of the Hesper-Mable Area Historical Society, the Toot and Whistle Club, and the Hesper Improvement Club. He also enjoyed restoring antique gas engines, blacksmithing, black-powder shooting, helping with Steam Engine Days, and building and flying radio-controlled airplanes.

Robert is survived by his wife, Clista Joyce, of Hesper; two sons, Arden of Hesper and Brian (Jeanne) of Mabel; a brother, Douglas (Barbara) of Rockford, Ill.; a sister-in-law, Marcia Street of Cedar Falls; and nieces and nephews. He was preceded in death by his parents and a brother, Harold.

Wilma Evelyn West, 90, of Fairfield, formerly of East Pleasant Plain, died Tuesday, December 19, 2014, at Mercy Hospital in Iowa City. She was born May 11, 1924, in Clark County, Missouri to Archie Ronald and Bertha Irene Pruett Cochran. She grew in Kahoka and graduated from high school in Revere. MO in 1942. Wilma married Homer G. West August 8, 1959 in Memphis, MO. He died May 28, 2014. During World War II, she worked at W.A. Sheaffer Pen Co. in Ft. Madison and later at the Iowa Army Ammunition Plant in Middletown, IA. She moved around the country with her husband while he worked construction. They moved back to low in 1987 after his retirement. Wilma was very active in the Pleasant Plain Friends Church, the USFW, and the Thunderbird Association for Red Cloud Tribe in South Dakota, helping collect and distribute clothing. She also collected and distributed food to local families and always helped those in

need. She was a member of the Antique Auto Club of America and judged car shows for 10 years and was an active member of the Brighton Lions Club. Wilma held many jobs while moving around the country but homemaking was her most important job. She enjoyed gardening, baking and canning, sewing and quilting.

Wilma is survived by her daughters, Sharon West of Fairfield and Lana Cox (Uli Trieb) of Davenport, step son Jake West (Nancy) of Blue Grass, six grandchildren 12 great-grandchildren, two brothers, Ronald Cochran of Weaver, IA and Robert Cochran of Argyle, IA; and three sisters, Lois Wixom of Keokuk, Twila Harper of Kohoka and Norma Jeanie Satori of Columbia SC. She was preceded in death by her parents, husband, son Ronald Davis, and step daughter Connie Sue West, grandson Ron Hansel, sister Erma Cochran, and half brother Stanley Cochran.


