## Love on Display.....by Tom Showalter

How do people who do not come to church encounter God? The book of Romans tells us, "For since the creation of the world God's invisible qualities have been clearly seen...so that men are without excuse." People have opportunity to encounter God through God's "invisible qualities."

Additionally, since we have been entrusted with the message of reconciliation and are ambassadors of Jesus Christ, the other way people encounter God is that they encounter us. The challenge we face as we see statistics is that some of the people we encounter do not have a favorable impression of Christians. Tony Nolan, in *Hurt Healer* offers this explanation, "The cause of this great dilemma points to a breakdown between the God we know and the God that we show." As a personal reflection, Is the God we know, the God we show?

In this month of February, the month in which we celebrate Valentine's Day, love is on display. We will celebrate the love of our lives with candy and cards. School children will sign Valentine's cards and give them to classmates. Love is in the air...

Have you ever thought about the way Jesus showed His love to us? The first things that come to mind may be the cross, His crucifixion, His death, burial, or the resurrection...God loves us and sent His Son for us.

As much as that displays God's love, there is a passage of Scripture that explicitly states, "He (Jesus) now showed them the full extent of his love." Is this found just before the crucifixion? Before the feeding of the multitudes? Where is the full extent of Jesus' love on display? The answer is John 13: 1-17. In this passage, Jesus serves by washing the dirty feet of the disciples. It's amazing to think that the Savior shows His love to the "full extent" by serving. He further challenges the recipients of this act of love: "I have set you an example that you should do as I have done for you" (John 13:15).

What does a servant look like today? He or she serves like Jesus served because of the love for the object of his service. It means doing things that no one else wants to do. It means we put our personal preferences aside for the sake of others. It means that we are aware of the reality that when we are with people who do not know our Savior, they encounter God because they see Jesus in us. What would this look like in our marriages? What would this look like in our families?...Church?...Community?...Workplace? People may not be in proximity to a place where they will encounter God, but we have the opportunity to encounter them. What will they see?

Iowa Yearly Meeting Missions Board announces the 2016 Easter Offering – the Mesquakie Retreat Center. Mac and Berny McDonald would like to equip and use the lower level of their residence as a retreat center, making it available for yearly meeting boards, individual churches, youth groups, families, or other groups needing a place to get away for worship, fellowship, planning sessions, and fun activities; and as lodging for mission teams.

Mesquakie Friends is situated on approximately 35 acres of woods, including a pond, locations for campfire sites, and an area for a possible prairie restoration. In addition to a place to enjoy the beauty of God's natural world, the grounds offer a worship center with full kitchen, a shelter house, basketball court, and a playground.

The focus for Iowa Yearly Meeting's Easter Offering is one of the rooms in the Retreat Center. This room will include two bunk beds and two small dressers. He spent the last couple of years teaching and preaching at Wellsford Community Church.

He was preceded in death by his wife, parents and a sister, Esther Johnson.

**Martina Cummings Bowman, 89**, of Oskaloosa passed away on Monday, January 18, 2016.

Born Helen (pronounced He-leen) Martina Cummings on January 24, 1926, in Warthen, Georgia, she was the oldest child of Vera and Oscar Cummings. Martina attended the Georgia State College for Women in Milledgeville, Georgia, her freshman year. She transferred to Asbury College in Wilmore, Kentucky, her sophomore year, where she majored in education and met her red-headed husband, Allen J. Bowman. Martina graduated in 1946 and the two were married on September 8th of that year.

In 1947, Martina and Allen moved to Alva, Oklahoma, where their two sons, Bill and David, were born. In 1950 the family moved to Wichita, Kansas, and Julie was added to the family a few years later. The family moved again in 1959 to Albany, California – outside the Bay Area. While there, Martina began working as a teacher’s aide for children with special needs, which was to become her life’s work. In 1966 the family moved to Oskaloosa, Iowa, where Martina began teaching special education and history at the junior high. This was a time when public schools were just beginning special education programs, and Martina helped shape the program for Oskaloosa and Mahaska County. Martina taught for 24 years, retiring in 1990.

Throughout her life Martina was an avid gardener, and she loved arranging fresh flowers every Sunday at College Avenue Friends, where she was an active member. At College Avenue Friends, she had many roles but is best remembered for her many years of leadership on the Fellowship and Helpfulness Committee which provided meals for church functions. Martina loved to read (fiction only). She often would read the last chapter of a book first if she was unsure of whether or not she would like the ending. She also loved music. She read the newspaper cover to cover every day. She saved the funnies for last as they were her favorite part of the paper. She would be disgusted if they weren’t actually funny.

Martina enjoyed cooking. She loved to watch the birds on the bird feeders outside her kitchen window. She will also be remembered for birthday cards. She made it her mission to send birthday cards to every friend, every church member, every colleague, and every relative on either side of the family. Martina’s family includes her husband, Allen J. Bowman, her children and their spouses: Bill and Kim Bowman of Lake Forest, California, Julie Bowman and Scott Bates of Evanston, Illinois, her daughter-in-law Karla Bowman, of Canal Fulton, Ohio; four grandchildren: Camille Bates, Evan Bates, Aiden Bowman and Liam Bowman; her brother Frank Cummings and numerous in-laws, nieces and nephews. In addition to her parents, Martina was preceded in death by her son, David Bowman, and her brother, Hudson (Sonny) Cummings.

## The Expansion of Belize Friends Ministry

The existing and continuing ministry in Belize City is a blessing that transforms the southside community from a place of hopelessness and violence to a place of hope and peace. There is a small Quaker meeting that has begun. Incarnational and relational work with one-to-one relationships is an opportunity for the communities' strengths and gifts to continue to be uplifted, as such, FUM also seeks a Pastoral Minister and a director of Belize Friends Ministries in order to implement the growing work in Belize City.

The Belize Friends School currently has space for about 25, and there is a demand among youth and adults for what is being offered. Also, while there are other service organizations on the Southside, the potential for connecting educational, spiritual and non-violent social growth is huge. FUM is seeking to revitalize the Alternatives to Violence Project in Belize City. Expanded space for the Belize Friends School, a new church space and a community center are integral to the continuing ministry.

The expansion of Belize Friends Ministry is a great blessing and a work both of the community and of the spirit interwoven together.

We praise God that the FUM General Board has approved a plan for expanding the ministry of FUM in Belize. We pray the Lord would bless this decision, and the fruits of this commitment will be shown in changed lives and transformed communities in Belize.
