The new Friends Response Service has already been in action. Tom Palmer has been acting coordinator until June 30th. We need someone(s) to take over the coordinator position and lead this service. Our annual Winter Family Banquet was a success with the largest attendance in years. We served 137 meals plus some children who eat without charge. Friends Theological College (FTC) repairs - Kenya: Written by Phena K. Shimaka.

I was blessed by having an opportunity to visit FTC this past April while I was in Kenya for a brief period. I was met by Jim

Hoeksema (who most of you know both Jim and Donna Hoeksema are currently at FTC Solar Energy project). Jim did not know I was in Kenya and stopping by FTC. He led the tour on campus of FTC, joined later by the Principal, Robert Wafula, everyone involved at FTC is doing a great job, but major repairs are needed.

Many of us have had repairs of some kind in our lives such cars, machines, human/animal as well as spiritual growth and so forth. Most of the buildings at FTC are in entire need of physical repairs. As noted above, the buildings were built many years ago and pose a health and physical dangers to the students and staff.

Library: The library where Donna has devoted her time restoring the torn books and cataloging them needs a wall to be placed that will separate the library from the computer lab. All the lights will need to be replaced with LED (Light- emitting diode) from the solar panels. These are just the interior repairs, the exterior **could** use some makeover too.



Water: Construction is underway for water supply; the big plastic water tanks leak and the bottom cement foundation that they sit on are worn out. The proposed new water tanks can hold up to 16000 liters of water. There are 2 different water sources for FTC, the cost effective source is the rain water that is harvested during



the rain seasons via the building roofs. One of the buildings the will supply this rain water needs gutters on the roof in order for the water to collected. The other water source is through the ministry of water that supplies water through pipes, but this water is usually not enough for the college use. There is a potential donor to help with the expenses of digging the well; however, the solar pump installation will cost approximately \$5000 and at this point, there is no money. It is important to have water reservoir8/storage because the water from the ministry of water had

been turned off for a week.

Dining Room/Kitchen: The dining room needs new lighting because of the solar system installation and the cooks are asking for a new refrigerator. The refrigerator does not work and is an old, old model. However, Jim Hoeksema does not recommend new refrigerator because it will consume a lot of electricity and the new solar system they are working on will not be able to sustain it. The solar system will be of great use for lighting only, but not the heavy duty appliances. You can imagine the cooks' challenges; feeding students 3 meals every day with snack in between without refrigeration system. This means every meal is planned carefully daily.

Oscar / Staff House: This was a staff house that at one time, Oscar from US lived in and used the kitchen to raise

chickens. The house currently houses 6 female students with one bathroom that is not functional. They are using the outer houses. The house is being repaired or upgraded so that it can house more than 6 students and have bathrooms installed. The means installing new plumbing, electrical wiring, tearing of walls and building new walls, windows/doors etc.

White House (Men Dormitory): The building was a mens' dormitory but was condemned by the Kenya Housing department because there is a problem with the floor (huge crack) and the walls are unstable. The house is built on a slope and the geology of the area was not studied prior to building. According to Jim, the building was planned to be demolished but he ad-



vised them to find an architecture that can work with them and bring the building to the standard. Robert Wafula stated he is working with the Kenya government and the FTC board to repair the

damage. Meantime, the students are housed in the basement of the bookstore. It not known when this will repaired because of the government is involved and availability of funds is limited.

I would like to thank many of you that have contributed to the efforts of keeping the FTC open and running in many ways. Your contributions, whether holding prayers, volunteering, giving a gift of any sort has kept the college running. There are many challenges the FTC faces but each day is a different day at



FTC. Jim Hoeksema said "the choice is between the teachers' sala-



ry, students 'aid or buying tools for repairs" All the tools are stolen because there is no maintenance person because there is no money to hire one. Jim was everything but he is in meetings most of the time that there is no one change the light bulb, fix the electrical wiring (the list is lengthy). The Green house that once was run by students as work study, now it is empty because there is no maintenance/supervisor to run it. I did IIIIIII suggest to Jim that one of the senior work study

students can take turns in that leadership role, but this has to come from the students and staff themselves.

Friends, I hope this has given you a picture of what repairs are going on and needed at FTC . I hope you can take this to your local meetings, various committees and pray about it. Why does FTC need repairs? Why do we need repairs in our lives? Psalm 23:3, Psalm 51:12.
