Are Today's Friends Institutions Being Forced to Compromise?

Friends have traditionally been on the forefront of education and have started several institutions of higher learning. Many of these were started to provide formal education for leaders in the Quaker movement and in Friends churches.


However, the trend of the day is that the degrees in ministry and lacking severely the student enrollment needed to sustain any type of ministry training program. Many Friends institutions have been forced to pour resources into degrees that pay the bills. They may still offer a Religion Degree that is broad based but the majority of their Academia is focused on mainstream degrees.

Thomas Hamm wrote this in his formal introduction to the book "Founded By Friends" on page xi, "All these schools, save perhaps Bryn Mawr, were founded to educate 'the children of the meeting' and to strengthen Quakerism. And most have experienced some strain with their founding bodies. Almost all have faced worries that they were making too many compromises, were not sensitive enough to the Quakers who founded and provided the critical early financial and moral support, and, by appealing to non-Friends, were forgetting the reasons for which they came into being." So where does that leave Yearly Meetings who are looking to these institutions to crank out leaders for our churches. Iowa has been fortunate to benefit from institutions like Barclay College that has pumped \$1.5 Million in the last five years into higher biblical and theological based learning in order to serve the Friends Church as a whole. Barclay has never been better suited to train students than it is today, offering online or on campus biblical and ministry training degrees. And lowa has seen the fruit of that, hosting many leaders that came out of Barclay equipped to enter the field as leaders locally.

So How does a Yearly Meeting support a college like Barclay in order to ensure that we continue to benefit from a Bible-based education? According to Dr. Adrian Halverstadt, the only way to secure ministry programs way into the future is to set up an Endowment that would fund a Ministry Chair. You can find out more information by contacting your Friends Institution and asking more about an Endowment.

What happens when we no longer have institutions **that** offer any kind of formal training for ministry? How then can Friends remain viable in the evangelical Friends movement?

Wayne Cecil Allman, 90, went to be with his Lord and Savior on Wednesday, August 31, 2016. Wayne was born to Harold and Ruth Perry Allman in Haviland, KS on October 9, 1925. The family moved to Paonia, CO in



1928 and then to Friendswood, TX (where his parents were reared) in 1932. He attended grade school and high school there. Collegiate and graduate work were accomplished at Friends Bible College in Haviland, KS; Bible College in Cleveland, OH; seminary in Kansas City, MO; and Northwestern University of Oklahoma, in Alva, OK. On July 9, 1946, he married Mary C. Steel in Mt. Pleasant, OH from which union were born two daughters, Cheryl Ruth and Marsha Kay.

On August 13, 2009, Wayne united in marriage with Ann Radford who brought much joy and happiness to his life. Together they enjoyed life and as his health declined she was his loving caregiver.

Wayne was Recorded a Friends Minister in 1951 and pursued an active ministry as pastor in Tongonozie, KS; Alva, Oklahoma; Marshalltown, IA; and New Hope Friends in Goldsboro, NC. Between the last two pastorates, he was the Superintendent of Iowa Yearly Meeting of Friends for eleven years and as Associate Secretary of Friends United Meeting of Friends for eleven years. While serving as Superintendent of Iowa Yearly Meeting, he with his family spent six weeks in Mexico serving Friends in the Ciudad Victoria area.

From 1990 to 1999, Wayne served on the Board of Trustees of the Houston Graduate School of Theology, and was also the Chairman of the Board of Advisors of HGST/NC for four years.

Retiring from the pastorate at New Hope Friends in October of 1994, he authored a 222 page book about his maternal grandparents titled, PIONEER FRIENDS PREACHERS. A second Edition of this book was published in 2001. Previously, he had authored the book titled, EXPERIENCING RENEWAL THROUGH GOALS.

When you don't have good balance, it is very scary to lean on a metal instrument and TRUST that it will help hold you up. When the gravel rocks move or your walker or cane sinks into the grassit leaves you in a precarious situation........cuz you might topple over! For me, it is worse when I am 'trusting' someone to push my wheel chair over the terrain, because it literally throws you around in your seat and you feel like you are going to fall out.
