Light Always Dispels Darkness

Matthew 5:14-16

"You are the light of the world. A town built on a hill cannot be hidden. 15 Neither do people light a lamp and put it under a bowl. Instead they put it on its stand, and it gives light to everyone in the house. 16 In the same way, let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven."

Light always dispels darkness! When you turn on a light in a dark room, there is never a question as to whether the dark is too dark or if the light is strong enough. A small amount of light will dispel the darkest dark! For the light to be light, however, there are some prerequisites. A man-made light, a flashlight for instance, needs a power source in addition to the flashlight's other working parts. Without batteries, a flashlight will not produce light. A flashlight without light has little value. If a flashlight is not producing light, it can be inspected to determine the reason for its lack of light; maybe the lightbulb is in need of replacement, perhaps the inner parts have become corroded and need a good cleaning, or perhaps the wires are loose and need to be reconnected.

Similarly, have you noticed the world around us seems to be getting darker and darker? Although we often do, we should not blame the darkness for being dark. It is only acting according to its nature. We cannot expect those who are not God followers to adhere to the same standards or life choices as those who are.

In a recent devotional, Experiencing God Day by Day, the author plainly states, "The only remedy for darkness is light." In the passage above, Jesus states "You are the light of the world." Ephesians 5:8: "For you were once darkness, but now you are light in the Lord. Live as children of light." Are you dispelling darkness? Is your light shining in dark places? The authors of Experiencing God Day by Day succinctly say it this way, "When God's light is allowed to shine unhindered through your life, the darkness around you will be dispelled."

"The first distinction of Quakerism as taught by George Fox was found in the fact that it sought to bring men into living and first-hand relationship with Jesus Christ. The second essential of the message of Quakerism, as I conceive it, is that it ring true to the word of inspiration as recorded in the Holy Scriptures." (Allen David Hole, The Place of the Quaker Message in Modern Life, p.71)

The Old Testament author gives us this hope and challenge under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, "...if my people, who are called by my name, will humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven, and I will forgive their sin and will heal their land" (2 Chronicles 7:14). The hope here is that God says He will "heal their land." However, before that can take place there are some conditions that need to be met according to this passage. We must "humble ourselves," "pray," "seek (God's) face," and "turn from (our) wicked ways." Understand this is addressed to God's people, not the world at large, but God's people. In other words, before the results can be seen or received the conditions must be met. Are our gathered meetings places of prayer? Are we exalting God's Holiness, bringing awareness of our sin, and then turning from that path? Are we humble?

I am most troubled by the questions that result. Are we, the people of IAYM, humbling ourselves, are we truly praying and seeking Him, and are we turning away from our own sin (rather than simply confessing the sins of "the world")? If we are not seeking His face, what else do we have to offer anyone in the context of our meetings, our communities, our families, etc.?

I am praying that Iowa Yearly Meeting will be a people who will exhibit this verse: "...if my people, who are called by my name, will humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven, and I will forgive their sin and will heal their land" (2 Chronicles 7:14).
