# **Shopping While Hungry**

I don't remember who the first person was to give me this advice and I can't recall when it was, but I do remember hearing, on more than one occasion, "Never go grocery shopping when you're hungry." It's very practical advice. If a person goes shopping on an empty stomach, often sound judgment and personal health are abandoned for whatever sounds good in that moment. My guilty indulgences are Oreos, ice cream, DiGiorno frozen pizzas, and red velvet cake.

I recently came across another piece of advice that sounds similar to this sage grocery shopping recommendation. The saying comes from Watchman Nee, the late pastor, teacher, theologian, and author. During his thirty years of ministry in China he wrote many books, planted churches, and started a substantial ministry to the youth in China that prepared many of them to become the next generation of missionaries, pastors, and church leaders. Nee was no stranger to starting new initiatives and challenging the norms in his day. It is for these reasons that his advice is so significant. He says, "Never decide on anything or start to do anything while emotion is agitating like a roaring sea. Again, during that time even our conscience is rendered unreliable."

This is important advice for us to observe, especially at this time of year. The New Year often comes with bucket loads of resolve. We steel ourselves, thinking that we can overcome addictions, lose weight, read more, look at

our phones less, and so on. But are the commitments we make at this time of year reliable, or are our consciences unreliable because of the heightened sense of confidence we feel? We have an entire year in front of us. A clean slate. A fresh start. In a lot of ways, that's inviting and offers us hope, but it often defies reality. It is like going for groceries on an empty stomach. With an entire year in front of us, there is a world of possibilities, but for many, the Oreos and ice cream are just too tempting.

Statistics tell us that roughly 80% of all resolutions made for the new year fail by February. This leads us to reason that many people are making decisions while their consciences are unreliable.

What does Scripture teach us on this topic? In Luke 14, Jesus is teaching a large crowd and says, "Suppose one of you wants to build a tower. Won't you first sit down and estimate the cost to see if you have enough money to complete it? For if you lay the foundation and are not able to finish it, everyone who sees it will ridicule you, saying, 'This person began to build and wasn't able to finish.' Or suppose a king is about to go to war against another king. Won't he first sit down and consider whether he is able with ten thousand men to oppose the one coming against him with twenty thousand? If he is not able, he will send a delegation while the other is still a long way off and will ask for terms of peace. In the same way, those of you who do not

give up everything you have cannot be my disciples."

Jesus counsels those who want to be his disciples, encouraging them to count the cost. It will cost them everything, including their very lives. He knows that this cannot be a decision based in emotion. In the same way, this is a great time of year to resolve to grow closer to Jesus and to become the people God created us to be. We can and should strive to grow in our faith, improve our physical health, and become more like Jesus, but we cannot do this with by making flippant promises to ourselves, others, or God simply because the new year is in front of us. Instead, take some time to prayerfully discern where God might be calling you to grow. One practice that has been helpful to me is to reflect on Galatians 5:22-23 and ask God to reveal to me which expressions of his Spirit I am not embodying well. Then, with His help, I resolve to grow in these areas through prayer, practicing spiritual disciplines, and with the help of a community that can encourage me and holds me accountable.

Some people don't like to make resolutions, or at least they don't like others to know that they're making them, but that's not the point of Nee's advice and Jesus's teaching. Instead, count the cost and, with the help of the Holy Spirit, consider how you might continue to grow into the person God created you to be. Don't be flippant or emotional but be prayerful and intentional. Partnering with God and His church is a constructive way to see your goals survive the entire year.

Many are the plans in a person's heart, but it is the Lord's purpose that prevails."

Our speaker will be Robert Radcliffe, co-pastor at Riverside Friends Church in Mason City.


**Lunch -** includes choice of hamburger, cheese burger, hot dog or walking taco; chips or fries; and a beverage

## William Penn University Scholarship Fund

#### Guidelines

Following are guidelines for the selection of candidates for this scholarship. The Scholarship committee shall consider applications for scholarships and make decisions as to recipients.

- 1. The amount of the scholarship will be determined by need of the applicant and by funds available.
- 2. The candidate shall be a participating member of Iowa Yearly Meeting.
- 3. A candidate from the Yearly Meeting shall have successfully completed secondary education requirements and shall have been accepted by William Penn University.
- 4. Applications must be received by January 31st, 2022
- 5. To be considered for a scholarship for the succeeding academic year, recipients must submit a request to the committee each year.
- 6. Scholarships shall only be awarded for a maximum of four (4) academic years.

## Kenneth & Betty Palmer Scholarship

The purpose of the Kenneth & Betty Palmer Scholarship Endowment is to assist students who are members of the Friends Church and who are involved in graduate studies (Masters or Doctoral program) in preparation for or furthering their ministry. This includes, but is not necessary limited to, pastoral ministry, missionary service, Christian Education and youth ministry.

A maximum assistance of \$500 per semester shall be granted to an applicant but final determination will be based on funds available and the number of eligible applicants.

Recipients of scholarship assistance shall **apply by May 1** for the next school year or four months before courses begin. Continuation of scholarship shall be determined by need and by funds available. The maximum anyone can receive under this scholarship program is \$4,000 or eight semesters, whichever first occurs.
