HOORAY! LET'S PRAY!

Sounds exciting, doesn't it? If you are looking for a fresh approach to teaching and actually praying with children, this book is a good place to look.

You'll find hands-on activities about prayer basics, age-appropriate ideas for pre-schoolers, suggestions for anytime-anywhere prayers (using those teachable moments to practice the pray-at-all-times concept), special occasion or holiday prayers that will catch their attention, and a section on prayers using scripture. There are reproducible pages to use with many of the activities.

I especially appreciated the chapter on child development and multiple intelligences. The authors do a good job providing us with more ways of understanding our students, and the different ways they learn.

This book could be used with pre-schoolers through pre-adolescents. I'm using it this quarter with the Middle School SS class as we do a prayer focus. Guess what? I'm learning as much (more?) than they are. Hooray! Let's Pray! is available through Group Pub. & the editor is Lois Keffer.

GIFT IDEA: COOKIE JARS

Have kids make these instant cookie jars for everyone on your church staff.

For each staff person, layer in a quart jar: 2/3 teaspoons salt; 1/2 plus 1/8 cup flour; 1/3 cup cocoa; 1/2 cup flour; 2/3 cup brown sugar; 2/3 cup sugar; 1/2 cup milk or semisweet choc. chips; 1/2 cup vanilla flavored chips; and 1/2 cup nuts.

Write these directions on a card: Combine the contents of the jar with 1 teaspoon vanilla, 2/3 cup vegetable oil, and 3 eggs. Pour the batter into a greased pan and bake at 350 degrees. Bake for 32 to 37 minutes in a 9 X 11 inch pan or 27 to 32 minutes in a 9 X 9 inch pan.

Use pinkish shears to cut a 4-inch square of fabric. Lay the fabric on top of the jar and use ribbon to tie the card around the fabric. This makes a beautiful and yummy gift.

WHY SOME TEENS SAY THEY DON'T ATTEND SUNDAY SCHOOL

(And some ideas that might help!)

1. "I'm Too Busy For SS". Keep lessons flexible. Make sure each lesson is complete so that kids don't feel left out if they miss a week or two. Hold a mid-week class aimed at kids who can't get there on Sunday.

2. "I'm Too Old For SS." Youth should realize that no one ever learns everything there is to know about God, the Bible and how to live the life God wants us to live. Interesting, relevant classes that keep kids actively involved will help.

3. "The Church Doesn't Care About Me." By planning a program that recognizes the needs and interests of their young members and utilizes their talents, a church can do much to keep the teens interested.

4. "Sunday School Is Dull And Boring." Classes for teens require the very best teachers. Give them all the help you can with training opportunities, resources, etc. Support them with prayer. Team teaching helps the lesson flow faster and keeps kids involved. Be sure lessons are relevant to the needs of your teens and help them find answers to the questions and problems that they have.

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Create A Church Prayer Calendar

Martin Luther once said, "Prayer is the most important thing in my life. If I should neglect prayer for a single day, I should lose a great deal of the fire of faith."

Do you realize the importance of prayer for your Sunday school, your teachers and each of your members? Why not create a monthly "Church Prayer Calendar" as a daily reminder of the needs of your Sunday School for the members of your entire church.

Prepare the prayer calendar in either an actual calendar form or as a list of dates with a different general prayer concern listed for each day. Examples: the individual families of your church, children of your community, each Sunday School teacher, Iowa Yearly Meeting concerns, a friend who does not attend Sunday school, the pastor, etc. Events, services and activities related to your Sunday School, church, and community could also be listed for prayer.

The prayer calendar should be made available to all members of your church and everyone urged to include the daily prayer focus as a part of their prayers.
